

As a part of our Book Study this year E06 have been creating artwork to compliment the book.






For 'Let's get a Pup' we drew on the dog using texta and made parts of our dogs 3D.

# TRANSITION TO HIGH SCHOOL



Year 6 families have been sent an email with a link to complete the application for secondary school online. Please ensure your email address and residential address is accurate and correct with our school.

Families will need to complete their child's application online before the due date **23rd May 2024** to ensure their nominated secondary school is considered. While families are able to nominate to attend any secondary school out of zone, the increase in enrolment demand from in-zone students may mean there is limited space available. It is recommended that families consider alternative secondary schools if applying for an out of zone secondary school.










A01 visited the kindy at the end of term 1 and we are looking forward to many more visits as we build a stronger connection with our school community.

## **AUTISM INCLUSION SPECIALIST**

#### **Routines to Thrive!**

Routines provide predictability, which helps reduce anxiety and allows children with autism to feel more secure in their environment. Knowing what to expect, helps children transition between daily-life activities more smoothly, and can be a support for undesirable behaviours. Consistent routines also support emotional regulation and independence by creating a structured, calming rhythm to the day.

Some routines which could be embedded might include:

- Use a visual schedule with pictures or words to show daily activities like meals, homework, play, and bedtime.
- Keep wake-up and bedtime the same each day.
- Prepare for the next day together (e.g. packing the school bag, choosing clothes) to reduce morning stress.
- Build in calm-down time after school, such as quiet play, sensory activities, or time in a preferred space.
- Use timers or countdowns to help with transitions between activities.



- Create a predictable routine for meals, including who sets the table or helps with clean-up.
- Establish a screen-free wind-down routine before bed with low-stimulation activities like reading or listening to calming music.
- Celebrate small successes with simple rewards or praise to encourage positive routines.

A few predictable moments each day can give children with autism a stronger sense of control and comfort—which can further support their own self-regulation.

#### **Exploring Education in New York: A Global Learning Experience**

#### **History of National Simultaneous Story Time**


